Bible Reading: Mark 1:9-15

In our reading from Mark's Gospel, we are told that the Spirit drove Jesus into the wilderness, which was a desolate place; a place where only the beasts and Satan lived. It was such a contrast to what happened previously when Jesus was told by the voice from heaven that he was God's Son.

Yet, instead of taken to a palace, Jesus was forcefully taken to a place where no one wanted to live; forcefully. It was all so arbitrary. Being the Son of the Creator of the universe did not exempt him from experiencing pain and suffering in the world.

Yet, it was exactly his time in the wilderness that transformed Jesus and prepared him for his ministry. It may only be a single verse in Mark's Gospel, but the suffering that Jesus endured within those 40 days in the wilderness shaped and defined the rest of his life and ministry.

Friends, suffering is a part of the fabric of the world where we live. Suffering is often unavoidable and beyond our human control. Suffering can even be very random and indiscriminate and arbitrary.

Yet, suffering can also lead us to the Divine. Out of the arbitrariness and randomness of suffering, a new kind of life can be born.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, his sake alone, but for ours also.
