# **Purpose/Function of the Church Council:**

"The Church Council shall give priority in its life to building up the Congregation in faith and love, sustaining members in hope, and leading the Congregation to a fuller participation in Christ's mission in the world. This priority shall be reflected in the agenda of its ordinary meetings" (Reg 3.1.2(a))

Rev Toby Keva has continued his full time ministry, which is supported by the Council. His leadership in worship, pastoral activities together with his introduction of new ideas and style is very much appreciated.

Toby and his family will be moving house in January 2025. They will move from their current house in Rockingham to our manse in Willetton.

The Church Website has been boosted with Lisa Breukelman becoming our "webmaster". Thank you Lisa for your great work.

From a property viewpoint it became apparent that the carpet in the hall was becoming unsafe. After investigation and receiving quotes it was decided to go ahead and replace with Vinyl Planking. The Council also agreed to ask the Congregation to support this with fund raising. Thank you to all who donated to offset the cost, which to date has covered approximately half of the cost.

Another reason for replacing the flooring is to hopefully encourage more people to use the hall and therefore provide more income. There has been some enquiries, but nothing to fruition as yet. If any of the Congregation members know of somebody wishing to hire a hall for a function please remember we may be able to assist.

It has come to light that the Church and manse may be undervalued for insurance purposes. The Synod is encouraging all congregations to use a Management Survey company to assess the value of buildings. The Council agreed that this should happen and we await the reports. A busy bee was held in October to get the grounds looking tidy. There was a great effort from those who attended. There are some people among us who do not wait for a busy bee to be arranged and quietly give their time and work in the garden, fixing small maintenance matters and other jobs. Our building is not new so there always seems to be something needing doing. A big thank you to all those who work behind the scenes.

Following the Fun Fair this year the Council circulated a survey to Congregation members to get their feedback. There was a very good response to this with most people giving a positive

response to the event. It was agreed by the Council to go ahead and have the event again next year.

It was also agreed that having the Fun Fair on the Easter weekend was not the best timing and

5 April 2025 has been chosen.

Elder and pastoral partner training was held on Saturday 21 September 2024. and was well attended.

I represented the Congregation at Synod on September 13, 14 and 15 and at Presbytery on November 9.

We were privileged to host the Service of Recognition for Ministers who have retired or died, on 14 September 2024. Thank you to all who contributed to this successful event.

During the year Vicki Banks resigned from the Council. We thank Vicki for her valued work for the Council and look forward to her ongoing contribution within our congregation.

Next year will mark 50 years since the congregation moved from the Rossmoyne Hall to our current building in Herald avenue. The Council has agreed to celebrate this event and 13th August 2025 is the suggested date.

The Council is looking for a person or persons to arrange this function.

From a financial point of view, the Council is aware that once again we are running at a deficit budget. Spending is being kept to a minimum, but with rising costs this is getting difficult. Our main income is from offerings and hall hire. We are all asked to give these our prayerful consideration.

The Council is in need of a secretary. We are all indebted to Vivienne Rowney who has done a fantastic job as our minute secretary. The position of Council Secretary requires attendance at 4 or 5 meetings and the processing of a very small amount of correspondence. Please give this your serious consideration. I would love to hear from you.

# Minister's Report for the Congregational Meeting on 17<sup>th</sup> November, 2024

#### Cafe Church

The last Cafe Church was held on 30<sup>th</sup> June. The topic of the day was the Handbook on Governance, Goals, and Plans for Willetton Uniting Church 2023-33. It was an opportunity to introduce the document to and explore it with the people in our church. I was encouraged by the level of enthusiasm and participation that the people showed on the day. During the table group sessions, people took the questions presented seriously and got involved in lively discussions with others around their table. I have collected the feedback papers and am looking forward to compiling the feedbacks into a more structured format to give us more ideas as we continue shaping and reevaluating the strategies into the future.

#### **Confirmation Group**

The group meet every 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday of each month at 3.30 pm. There are six participants in the group, three are in the process of becoming confirmed members of our church. Since our last congregational meeting, the group have met three times on 19<sup>th</sup> June, 18<sup>th</sup> September, and 16<sup>th</sup> October. In each gathering, the group discussed a particular topic related to Christian faith via questions, activities, meditations, prayers, Bible readings, and/or quotations from 'experts' in the field.

#### **Elders Meeting**

The Elders meet bimonthly on the first Sunday of the month. The Elders have met twice this year on 18<sup>th</sup> August and 6<sup>th</sup> October. During the meeting, each Elder shared the pastoral concerns of the people under her/his list. The pastoral list has also been recently updated to reflect those who have recently passed away, the new people who have joined our congregation, and those who have left our fellowship. At the moment, we need more people to become Elders and/or Pastoral Partners to further share the responsibilities of caring for the people in our church. This is crucial especially during those times when an Elder is sick and is unable to carry out her/his pastoral duties.

#### **Elders and Pastoral Partners Workshop**

A training for the Elders and Pastoral Partners was held on 21<sup>st</sup> September. The workshop covered a number of topics, including pastoral styles and boundaries. Following the workshop, the Elders and Pastoral Partners discussed some pastoral concerns of the people in the pastoral list.

#### **Welcomers Training**

On 26<sup>th</sup> June, a training was held for people who have been asked to help as Welcomers. During the training, we first talked about the qualities and characters required to become an effective Welcomer. We then explored the duties of a Welcomer on a Sunday and talked about each duty in more details. The Welcomer will work alongside a Greeter on Sunday.

The main role of the Welcomer is to welcome, befriend, and accompany a Newcomer, and to make a follow—up contact during the week.

#### **Stewards**

A meeting for all the Stewards was held on 26<sup>th</sup> May immediately after the worship service. The goal of the meeting was to revisit the list of duties that had been compiled before and to help the stewards re-familiarize themselves with those duties. The list was then updated by removing some duties that had been redundant and adding new ones into the list. All the Stewards are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the current list and to review it regularly, especially when they are rostered on a Sunday.

#### **Meditation Group**

I have led exercises for the Meditation Group every fourth Thursday of the month. The exercises are from the book, Sadhana, which is a meditation guide book by the renowned Indian Jesuit, Father A. J. De Mello. During each exercise, the participants are invited to focus and reflect on different parts of their body or aspects of their life or the surrounding environment.

## **Special Services**

Some special services were held in succession earlier this year. They were: ANZAC Commemoration Service on 28<sup>th</sup> April, Country Women Association Centenary Service on 5<sup>th</sup> May, Mother's Day on 12<sup>th</sup> May, and Pentecost Day on 19<sup>th</sup> May. Each was a joyous occasion.

#### **Guest Speakers**

Steve McKinnon, the WA State Manager of Prison Fellowship, gave a presentation in our Sunday service on 4<sup>th</sup> August. Prison Fellowship is a Christian not for profit organization that works with prison inmates and their families. Steve talked about the history, values, purpose, and work of the Prison Fellowship. He also shared stories about the life of inmates who had been transformed by the ministry of the people who volunteer and work for the Prison Fellowship.

Rev. Dr. Andrew Williams, the General Secretary of WA Synod, preached in our Sunday service on 25<sup>th</sup> August. Andrew's focus reading was Ephesians 6:10-20, which talks about the spiritual armor of God. His talk was very interactive and engaging, using his cycling hobby and gears as examples. He even brought his own bike to the church!

In our Sunday service on October 13, Chaplain Jenny Schleusener from HMAS Stirling shared her experience as a female Chaplain in the Royal Australian Navy. Jenny based her reflection on the readings for the day, which were Mark 10:17-31 and Hebrews 4:12-16.

## **Hayden Wiseman**

On 15<sup>th</sup> September, people in our church and beyond were treated to beautiful music by the violinist, Hayden Wiseman who was on a tour in WA. Hayden is an accomplished violinist who is a graduate of Western Australia Academy of Performance Arts (WAAPA). He now collaborates with churches around Australia and overseas, playing beautiful hymns, worship

songs, movie scores, and classical pieces for them. Hayden played some of his music and shared some his stories during our worship service on the day. He then performed his own solo concert in the afternoon. His musical skill and talent were greatly appreciated by those who attended.

#### **Induction Service**

On 28<sup>th</sup> September, we celebrated the induction service of Rev. Lyall Reid into the chaplaincy in the Royal Australian Navy. The service was co-led by Rev. Kaye Ronalds (the member of the Religious Advisory Committee to the Services of the Defence Force), Rev. Lyall Reid, and myself. It was attended by a number of guests, including Rev. Ian Tozer (the Moderator of WA Synod), clergy members of WA Presbytery, and HMAS Stirling Chaplains and their spouses. A special morning tea was held after the service to welcome the guests.

#### **Music Team**

Deirdre Russel has sadly resigned as an organist due to personal illness. Deirdre's ministry spanned not only decades, but also multiple generations. I wish to thank her for her faithful service in our church. Currently, there are only two organists available for the music roster: Janice Barret and Barbara Bennewith. We need to identify and encourage more skillful and talented musicians to be included in the roster. We are currently exploring ways to get some of the local music students to play in our worship service. Some financial incentive may be needed to make this a reality.

A memorial service to celebrate the life of Rev. John Phillipson was held on 26<sup>th</sup> October in our church. The service was well attended by members of John's family, friends, and colleagues, including past Moderator, Rev. John Dunn, who organised the service, and the current Moderator, Rev. Ian Tozer who preached in the service.

#### **Presbytery and Synod Meetings**

I attended the Presbytery meeting on 15<sup>th</sup> June in Floreat Uniting Church. The theme of the meeting was United Together. Rev. Judy Sanderson from Applecross delivered an outstanding sermon about the theme, reflecting on her experience growing up in an African–American family in the United States. During the meeting, the Presbytery inducted a number of ordained Ministers to fill the various roles in the Presbytery.

Bruce Read and I attended the last annual Synod meeting that was held on 14<sup>th</sup>–15<sup>th</sup> September at Scotch College. The meeting was facilitated by the Moderator, Rev. Ian Tozer and was also attended by the President of the Uniting Church, Rev. Charissa Suli (the youngest and first CALD person to be elected as President) and the Chairperson of the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress. Rev. Mark Kickett. A verbal report will be given during our congregational meeting.

#### **INCOME**

Offerings – Offerings have decreased. Budget estimate reflects change.

Manse – Toby expects to move into the manse in January hence no income.

**Church Property** - increased for 2025 in hope we can encourage other groups to use the premises.

(note: Shapedisability have paid \$3,250 'up front').

**Other Income** – This hard to budget – depends on donations received for various services provided. Eg: funerals.

#### **EXPENDITURE**

**Insurance** – Expected to rise significantly following Quantity surveyor report.

**Church Maintenance** – we have an aging building. Costs are kept to a minimum but there is always the unexpected.

Manse Maintenance – There may be some expenses prior to Toby moving in.

As most of you would be aware preparing a budget is 'tricky' especially in this financial climate.

As you can see the Church will once again anticipate a deficit budget.

The only way we can change this it to increase income, this needs to be by way of offerings and property use.

Expenses are kept to the minimum. But, there is always the unexpected.

# PROPERTY REPORT

#### Church

The new **vinyl planking** in the hall and entry has been completed. Thank you to all congregation members who donated to this project.

#### Manse

There have not been any issues with the manse since the tenants moved in December 2023.

Toby and his family will be move into the Manse in January 2025. The current lease will expire on 20<sup>th</sup> December 2024 and the tenants have been advised they must vacate.

An inspection will be carried out prior to Toby moving in to check on any maintenance which is required.

# **MUSIC MINISTRY REPORT - Outreach Concerts**

Romans 12:6 says: "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them". We are encouraged by that suggestion from the scriptures to continue the Music Ministry. The absence of our versatile organist/pianist/choir conductor Deirdre Russell OAM due to a series of illnesses this year has been keenly felt, but those who are still able work musical magic. Both Janice and Barbara work wonders with the Schweelink electronic organ and guide us in our familiar traditional hymns. Minister Toby has brought a new dimension to worship, employing his tuneful tenor voice and guitar strumming to keep us on key with interesting modern works. The main function of the Music Ministry in 2024 has been 3 Outreach Concerts conducted in June, August and October: the first in June specifically for pianists, and the latter two "variety" concerts for a variety of piano, voice and other instruments. The joint aims of the outreach concerts is firstly to raise the church's profile and encourage local residents to enter an unfamiliar church building, not to worship, but to enjoy entertainment. Secondly to follow the Romans text and give youthful emerging musicians the opportunity for public performance in a friendly, non-judgmental environment. There is evidence that regular churchgoers have resulted from non-churchgoers attending (and/or performing in) a past concert or two, and being made feel they are worthy and welcome. These concerts are not intended to be fund-raisers. We do not expect the congregation to sell tickets, but advertise "admission by donation". Funds raised in 2024 have been in excess of \$1,000. Income might be considered low for the amount of effort and organisation contributed, but so are expenses, the main one being the annual tuning of the Yamaha acoustic piano before the regular June Classical Piano Recital. This consumes about one-third of that figure. Design and artwork on the advertising posters and programmes has in recent years been donated by a local professional who shares our enthusiasm for the aims of the Music Ministry, and (with Barbara's encouragement) our OKI colour printer prints them all on-site. Moving the heavy, full-size upright Yamaha from its 'resting' position to the 'performance' area was becoming more difficult for our ageing congregation and also damaging the carpet. Larger wheels have now been installed on the Yamaha, financed by Music Ministry funds. Hopefully they will solve that problem, and also make it **much** easier to move. All three 2024 outreach concerts have been well attended. Positive comments from performers, congregation members and the wider public encourage me to hope that we could repeat the same number and timing in 2025, with the first piano recital to be held at the end of June.

The dynamics of the group changed over the years as many of the women began to work. Slowly due to ill health and members not driving at night the group has diminished and this year it was decided to abandon the Ladies Evening Fellowship completely.
