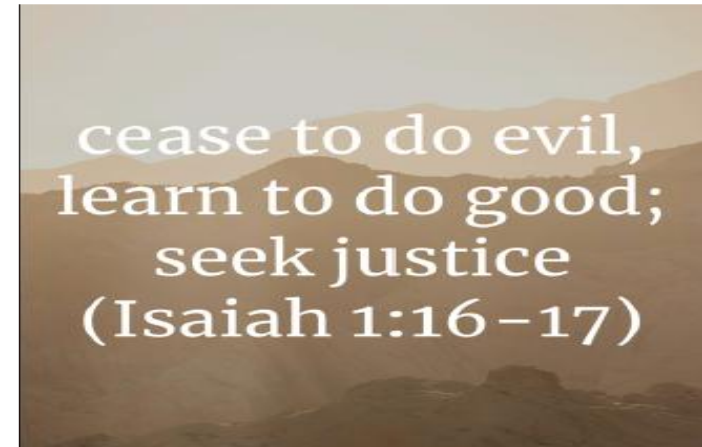

Reflection On Bible Reading Isaiah 1:10-20

Isaiah was not against worship in itself; what he was against was using worship to cover one's evil action. He was against the misuse of worship. The people of Israel then expected that, by sacrificing the animals, God would forgive their sins and forget about their wrongdoings. By participating in the animals sacrifice in the temple, they hoped that their guilt would be wiped clean and they would be 'free' to commit another crime. They saw a 'loophole' in their religious law and used it for their own personal benefits. But Isaiah reminded them that worship could not be separated from their daily life. For him, true sacrifice was not the animals sacrificed in the temple; true sacrifice involved one's dedication to live a just life. For Isaiah, winning God's favour did not happen when one offered sacrifice in the temple; it happened when people "cease to do evil, learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow." (Isaiah 1:16-17 NRSV) **(Rev. Toby Keva)**
